Commodore to retire

Commodore Alec James Hort, commodore of the British and Commonwealth fleet since 1969 and master of Windsor Castle, completed his final voyage for the company at Southampton on August 10 and will retire on September 14.

Alex Hort joined the Union-Castle Company in 1936 after serving his apprenticeship with W. Hogarth & Son and seeing service with several other companies. From then until the outbreak of war he acted as a junior officer in three of the company's mailships and as chief officer of Walmer Castle. After service in the RNR he returned to Union-Castle, receiving his first command—Rustenburg Castle—in 1944. From then until taking command of Windsor Castle in 1965 he command's vessels.

Commodore Hort has enjoyed an enviable reputation as a ship's master. His consummate skill as a sailor has often been reported in the South African press when he has carried out some difficult manoeuvre with his ship. His popularity with his passengers and his ability to mix with people make him a delightful and amusing host. This popularity has extended beyond the passenger accommodation: his honesty and sense of fair play have endeared him to all who served under him.

Commodore Hort is a keen gardener, an enthusiastic golfer, and a knowledgeable follower of racing. His retirement will be spent improving his skill in these fields.

Retirements

Phil Cannings joined the Company in July 1927 as a third class assistant steward aboard Arundel Castle, and served on many vessels including Kenilworth Castle, Armadale Castle, Carnarvon Castle and Walner Castle.

Alick Carey retired on June 30 after over 40 years service with the Union-Castle Line, which he joined as second class assistant steward Walmer Castle. He joined Warwick Castle as BRS on her maiden voyage in 1931 where he remained until 1936, then joined Stirling Castle for her maiden voyage.
