Busiest Summer in History of Life. Roat Service

The summer of 1959, which was stated by the Meteorological Office to be the driest on record, has been the busiest in the whole history of the life-boat service. Between 1st April and 30th September, life-boats were launched on service 547 times. The previous record figure for these months was established in 1956 when life-boats were launched on service 495 times

during the summer. Even in 1940, the year of the Battle of Britain, life-boats were called out on service between 1st April and 30th September only 419 times.
