

CAPTAIN CHARLES D. MAVITTY Master of the Nina Bowater

Captain Mavitty's sea career commenced in the Clan Line for, after two years in the schoolship Conway, he joined the turbine steamer Clan Mactaggart (Captain T. Forrett) at Birkenhead in September, 1931, as an Indentured Apprentice. He obtained his Second Mate's Certificate in 1934 and during this period of depression in world trade, made several voyages as a Cadet in the Clan Line's New York/Cape service. These trips were not without their hardships as, in winter months, and within certain limits on the North American coast, the Lascar crews were not allowed to work on deck because the Indian Government considered that the cold was too extreme for their nationals, so all the deck work of the ship was taken over by eight Cadets.

After nine years with the Clan Line, Captain Mavitty reached the rank of Third Officer and then transferred to the Orient Line with whom he served throughout the Second World War. He was engaged in ferrying troops to civilians from Ceylon, Singapore and Middle East countries and, in the Otranto, took part in the landings at Aleiers.

Early in 1948 Captain Mavitty joined the Suez Canal Company and, after a spell as Harbour Pilot at Port Said, transferred to the Canal pilotage at Ismailia. In this service he piloted numerous Clan Line vessels, ships of the Union-Castle Round Africa Service and King Line.

His career in Egypt ended in 1956 following the military operations there. In 1957 he joined The Bowater Steamship Company. At that time only the Margaret Bowater and her

The Chief Engineer of the Nina Bowater's is Mr. K. A. B. Liddle, Born in 1907 at Arbroath, he served his Apprenticeship with Alex Shanks & Son Lid., and went to sea with the British India and the Arbridge State of the Apprenticeship with Alex Shanks Steam Novigation Company before joining Bowaters on 10th August, 1961. During the second World War he was Engineer in Charge of an Engineering firm in India engaged on War work. He was responsible not only for the power plant but was also in charge of the tool room making precision tools and gauges for the 25 pounder shells produced. The output of shells was 25,000 per week and hundreds of tools and gauges. He was also in charge of Air Raid Precaution Details.

Company Mr. Liddle has served in the Markland, Gladys Bowater and Nicholas Bowater in addition to his present ship.
