They Won

We recorded in the April Magazine that the Catering Efficiency Cup awarded to Intermediate vessels had been won by the Rhodesia Castle and early in June Mr. Bernard Cavzer visited the ship in London Docks to present the trophy to Captain A. C. M.



At 1130 hours Local Time on 20th June, when in Position Lat. 10°35'N. Lone 82°32'F, the Clan Maclennan received a Distress Message from the s.s. Union Atlantic, carrying a cargo of iron ore, that her No. 1 lower

hold was full of water Radio contact was made with several vessels in the vicinity after her request for help. Maidan gave her position as 191 miles west of the Distressed Vessel and estimated her time of contact to be about midnight: Clan Maclennan shortly afterwards. At 2248 hours in Position Lat.

12°20'N, Long. 86°31'E the Union Atlantic was abandoned. At 0505 hours Maidan reported having picked up all survivors; Clan Maclennan, only an estimated 21 miles from the distress position, accordingly altered course and resumed her passage, having steamed an additional 200 miles in an endeavour to aid the disabled ship.
