Mr. R. T. Buchanan, Chief Engineer Officer, retired at his own request on 1st August. Forty years ago-on 29th April, 1925-Mr. Buchanan joined the Clan Line as Fifth Engineer, Clan Malcolm. He subsequently served on the Buteshire and in 1928 passed his Second Class Certificate.

After service in the Clan Macbrayne, Clan Macphee and Halesius, he obtained his First Class Certificate and was appointed Third Engineer of the Argyllshire; this was followed by a period in Hesperides before promotion to Second Engineer in 1935

He was serving in this rank on the Maiden Voyage of the Clan Lamont when war was declared during the passage home from Cape Town. He was promoted Chief Engineer of the Clan Skene and two days out from New York, on 10th May, 1942, the vessel was sunk by enemy action. The survivors spent 36 hours in lifeboats before being picked up by an American destroyer. Mr. Buchanan returned to America in January, 1943, and took over one of the new Liberty ships, the Sambalt. During his service on this ship he took part in the ferrying of troops and supplies after the Normandy Landing.

Following the cessation of hostilities, normal Company duties were resumed. He sailed on the Clan Buchanan and Clan Davidson, R.N., which were re-converted by the Company, the Clan Davidson being the first passenger ship of the Clan Line. Thereafter he was appointed to the Clan Sinclair and Clan Robertson, both newly built at Greenock. After eight years on the latter ship, his next appointment was to the Clan Maclachlan, following which he completed two trips in the Sarah Bowater prior to retirement.
