Carnarvon Castle, built in 1867 (1,200 tons), was one of Donald Currie's East India Traders. Captain J. C. Robinson, her commander for many years, described how a private party was arranged to sail in her from the United States to England, and landed twenty-seven days after embarking in the Hudson River.

The Union-Castle Chronicle tells us: "J. C. Robinson was one of many Currie men who, having trained in the Fast India Castles, formed a nucleus of efficient officers for

the coming venture into steam. The change to steam caused much regret to Captain Robinson, as it did to many others. The stately Carmaron Cartle, he wrote, was the smartest and the best equipped sailing ship that ever the who colours of the British Mercantile Marine.
