

This scene is regroduced from the Graphic of September 29, 1883. Readies of the Unious-Caulle Chronicle will recall how Sir Donald Currie took a payin of guests on a crate in his new Pembrock Castle. On board were the Prime Minister (Mr. W. E. Glattone) and the Poet Laurest (Mr. Alfred Tennyson). The craise was originally to be around Britain but the skip crossed to the coast of Norway and then on to Copenhagen. Mr. Gladstone found himself in the greatest allightone with the Queen who

wrote: "The Prime Minister—and especially one not gifted with pradence in speech—is not a person who can go about where he likes with impunity..." He had made the mistake of not seeking Het Majesto permission before venturing out of Territorial Waters.
