

A SIGHTLY improved Arab, the R.M.S. Trojan represented the reply of the Union Line to Donald Currie's Kinfauns Castle and Grantully Castle. She caused much interest at the time of her appearance by being the first Cape liner to be fitted with "the electric light" which, however, was fitted only in the "Grand Saloon".

On her maiden voyage, Trojan went up the coast as far as Natal in order to embark the Empress Eugenie, who returned to England in the vessel after visiting the scene of the death of the Prince Imperial in

Ten years later, when the Boer War broke out, she was at once requisitioned at Southampton for use as a hospital ship. In 1900 she was sold for scrap but was taken over by Elder, Dempher and Company (Beaver Line), by whom she was renamed Wassun. She was interded for the Canadian trade, but within a treatment of the Canadian trade, but within a renamed her Islam. She did not remain long afloat. A dispute arose about the purchase price; she again changed hands and was scrapped at Preston in 1902.
