the Chief Zulu as a memento of the occasion. In his speech of thanks Israel KaZulu said he was "most impressed with the ship", and that he was grateful to the company for affording him the opportunity to visit her. He remarked that this was the first time he had ever been on a ship and was reminded of his grandfather, the famous Chief Cetwayo, who was the first Zulu to travel overseas to visit Queen Victoria on board one of the same company's ships.

After the presentation the group was taken on a tour of Zulu crew accommodation and the rest of the ship. When the Chief Zulu and party disembarked all the work at the docks stopped as African labourers came to greet their chief with the traditional royal greeting "bayete".

The chief was so impressed with his visit that next day we were asked to conduct 30 members of the college of chiefs, which is run by the South African government for sons of chiefs and headmen, to prepare them for their future responsibilities. Members of this group, all young Zulus of the 18-26 age group, displayed keen interest. Cayzer, Irvine in Durban are responsible for recruiting Zulu crew for B&C vessels and Royal Inter-ocean liners.
