P. R. Arrand, retired chief engineer, died April 10, aged 77 years. He retired June 8, 1966, after 40 years' service.

J. Baird (The Greenock Dockyard Limited) died April 1. He retired December 31, 1959, at the age of 65.

J. Cato died May 1, aged 70 years. He was a crane driver with Dock Services Limited before his retirement in June 1969. He leaves a widow.

G. W. Cooke died June 9, aged 84 years. He retired from the stewards' department, Royal Albert Dock, on November 1, 1956, after serving with the company for 48 years.

M. Edney died June 1, aged 84 years. He retired October 1, 1953, as a waiter, Royal Albert Docks, after 52 years' service.

W. H. Farnan, former leading hand, died May 6, aged 70 years. He served with the company for 35 years.

Capt. A. H. Freer died May 22, aged 62 years. Capt. Freer retired March 1, 1973, after serving with the company for 33 years 9 months. He leaves a widow.

L. W. J. Harding (greaser, retired June 1965) died May 12, aged 81.

P. G. Lambert, chief bedroom steward, died May 25, aged 80 years. He retired November 1962 after 41 years' service.

T. C. Leonard, stevedore superintendent, Port of Liverpool Stevedoring, died May 4, aged 70 years. He retired March 30, 1970. He leaves a widow.

T. Morris, purser/chief steward, died May 11, aged 78 years. He retired June 1, 1961.

W. P. Ore (chief engineer, retired January 1958) died June 20, aged 82 years.

C. E. Peachy, purser catering officer, died May 17, aged 52. He served with the company for 16 years.

W. J. Perren died June 13, aged 76 years. A carpenter, he retired March 1964 after 38 years' service. He leaves a widow.

J. G. Walker, first engineer, died May 21, aged 92 years. He retired March 1, 1945, after 24 years' service.

W. C. Adams, former Union-Castle chief steward, died recently at his home in South Africa, aged 92 years. He joined Union-Castle in 1901, becoming a chief steward at the age of 31. His last ship was *Garnaroon Castle* and he retired in 1947.

Franco Caudarella died on May 26. Born 1910 in Milan, he emigrated to South Africa before the second world war and served with Sturrock (Cape) Ltd., which later became Aero Marine Travel. In February 1972 he was appointed branch manager in Durban for Castlemarine Travel Limited (the merged interests of Aero Marine Travel and Castlemarine). He leaves a widow.

W. T. Kophamel died April 24 aged 66 years. He joined Dock Services (Liverpool) Ltd., as a shipwright on January 5, 1954, and retired on September 23, 1973, after 19 years' service in Birkenhead.

John Ellis (Cayzer Steel Bowater Ltd.) died on June 9. John joined the staff of Percy B. Swain & Co. Ltd. in June 1941 at their wartime headquarters at Haywards Heath. Toward the end of the war the firm moved back to the City of London, where John Ellis spent the whole of his working career with the exception of a short period away through ill health. When Swains joined Steel Brothers & Higgins Insurance Ltd., in 1968 and during the subsequent mergers, he happily adapted himself to the changes. His colleagues admired his cheerful attitude to life and his determination, in spite of his disability. His death is particularly sad, as he had set his mind on finishing the course by retiring in September of this year at age 65. He leaves a wife, two sons and a daughter.
