

Mailship becomes floating campus

CAPE TOWN—*Windsor Castle* became South Africa's first floating campus for 10 days this month when a Summer School at Sea was held on board during the flagship's coastal cruise.

To mark the silver jubilee of the University of Cape Town's annual Summer School, six of the school's courses were held on the mailship. The campus cruise, starting and ending in Cape Town, was from February 7 to 16.

The Summer School at Sea was arranged by the university with the co-operation of Castlemarine, who offered summer school participants the special low-season rate of R150 for the round trip (first class fares higher). The six courses were available at the usual rates levied by the university, varying from R5-00 upward.

The courses available on the floating campus were *Contemporary Cinema* (10 sessions); *World Religions* (five lectures); *The Iron Age in Africa* (five lectures and a two-day archaeological 'dig' at Dignaanstad); *Navigation* (seven sessions, including five lectures and two practicals on the bridge of *Windsor Castle*); *Contemporary Dance Forms* (five lectures); and *Psychology of the 70s* (five lectures).

The courses, open to 250 summer school students, all took place during the daytime to allow participants to enjoy the wide range of shipboard entertainments at night.

ILS Liverpool chooses Dataplex electronic system for shipping documents

LIVERPOOL—In shipping where documents must be available to shippers within the shortest time possible after goods have been loaded, and where inevitably peak concentrations occur, equipment to carry out this work must be as up-to-date as possible. To meet such needs International Liner Services have just installed in their Liverpool office an up-to-the-minute elec-

tronic system for the production of shipping documents.

The company has chosen the Dataplex 1200 magnetic card system and four of these machines are already in operation at the ILS office in Royal Liver Building. From details of each shipment, a bill of lading and freight account are produced with all calculations made. This information is then stored
