



■ When Clan Malcolm was berthed in Dundee recently, the cadet training unit (with training officer Robin White) visited the home of Sir James Gayzer—Kinpurmie Castle, a castle built in the Scottish baronial style in the fertile farmland of Angus. Pictures show (above left) a general view of the impressive castle and, above right, the visiting cadets with Sir James Gayzer in the centre and Robin White at the extreme right. There are 20 mixed farms on the estate, which was bought from the Earl of Wharncliffe by Sir Charles Gayzer in 1902. The house was completed by architect Patrick Thoms in 1907. The adjoining estate of Landis was added in 1972. In ancient times Kinpurmie belonged to Robert the Bruce.

Small scale models show 45-year B&C ship history
