in uniform from Clan Macitur, Noor Islam, donkeyman, aged 50 years. Also born in Chittagong. G. P. L. Perera, senior second engineer


officer, Aged 29 years, he had served with R&C for six years. At the request of his family his body was returned to Ceylon where funeral arrangements were made.
